Please keep the following information handy:

A free **Orientation BBQ** will be held on **Thursday, August 1**st, starting at **5:30pm** at Hawrelak Park. You can drive and park at Hawrelak on this day only. During Festival days, you will have to take ETS.

We will find out whether or not we are getting ETS bus passes at the BBQ.

You will be given a Festival T-shirt upon arrival of your first shift. Please be sure to check in at the Volunteer Trailer to pick it up and also please check in at the start of each of your shifts. The Volunteer trailers and tent are located in the same place as last year. For those of you who are newbies, when you enter the gates, turn left, and you will see the Volunteer white tent and trailers located up against the trees bordering Groat Road about a block or so down.

ONE MAJOR CHANGE THIS YEAR for all ticket sellers: all sellers will be cashed out BEFORE they leave the site. Their driver will bring them back to base, where the Seller will then go into the Bank Trailer and sit with one of the volunteers and be cashed out. Sellers must keep ALL of their receipts together with their Sellers Sheet (the sheet they are given when they pick up their float) and these must match with what is in the count room. Sellers are reminded that at each collection during their shift, it is imperative they count the money the driver is taking and ensure it matches the amount on the receipt before they sign the receipt. This will help to ensure a fast and accurate cashout at the end of each shift.

Please do not wait to call me. If you have the slightest inkling that you and your "over 18" friends would like to participate, PLEASE GET IN TOUCH WITH ME ASAP. It takes a lot of work to put this all together, and the sooner I know, the more efficient I can be on behalf of the Lions. Commitments already received from several Lions clubs – join the bandwagon and have a great weekend of fun at the same time.

In 1999 a lady who lived in Calmar, Alberta, Clara Bablitz, was house bound due to a medical condition.

The Devon and Calmar Lions clubs purchased an electric wheel chair and presented it to Clara on a permanament loan basis, as her funds were not sufficient to make this purchase.

This gave Clara a new lease on life as she was now mobile to go to the post office, the grocery store, and the seniors facility at times when she chose to, as opposed to waiting for someone to take her when their time permitted.

Being mobile allowed her to carryout service projects in the community, which she continued to do for several years.

In the year 2009 she found the resourses to purchase her own electric wheel chair. At that time she returned the Lions permanament loan electric wheel chair to the Lions club. The Bablitz chair was serviced and brought back up to standard and placed out on permanament loan to another deserving individual.

In 2013 Clara Bablitz passed away after several months in poor health, at the age of 68.

Todd and Debbie Robertson inherited Clara's purchased electric wheel chair, realized it was in very good condition and still quite valuable.

Todd and Debbie decided that their mother would want to return the great service favour she had received so many years ago that changed her life forever, and donated her purchased electric wheelchair to the Devon Lions club to be used by some other house bound person.

This is a prime example how service to others can be perpetuated back from life beyond the one we know.

Lions for Dummies Part 1

- 1. All Lions are members of a Lions Club. Even the President of Lions Clubs International must be a member of a Club.
- 2. All Lions are volunteers. Employees of Lions Clubs International or of Multiple Districts, Districts, or Clubs may be Lions, but it is not a condition of their employment, nor are paid positions offered as a reward for being a Lion.
- 3. Membership is by invitation. This does not mean that a Club cannot be approached - just that the person must be approved by the Club. Exception: A lion transferred from another Club is automatically accepted.
- 4. Every Club is autonomous: sets its own agenda, projects, and fundraising activities. Each Club must adhere to the Standard Constitution and By-laws; of Lions International. Individual Clubs (also Multiple Dis-‡ tricts and Districts) may devel-5 op their own Constitution and By-laws, but nothing in them may contravene International's Standard Form.
- 5. Every Club elects its own officers annually. Those officers - President, 1st, 2nd, § and 3rd Vice Presidents, Im-g mediate Past President, Secre-4 tary, Treasurer, (or Secretary-Treasurer), plus 4 directors, p the membership chair, the tail twister, the Lion Tamer, and § anyone appointed by those officers, constitute the Board. The Board essentially filters matters brought to the Club, makes recommendations, apminor expenditures, proves


and generally directs the affairs of the Club.

6. Lions Clubs do not meet in

- secret, nor keep its affairs and business secret. However, it is not customary to discuss denon-Club members are present. 7. All Lions Clubs are part of a District, generally due to geographic proximity. The minimum size for a District is 1250 Lions, but there is no maximum. Districts may be divided into Zones for administrative convenience and to provide a framework for geographically Districts also have Regions, especially in larger Districts, to support for Zones and Clubs.
- 8. Each District elects a District Governor for a one year term. The Governor and his or her Cabinet provides leadership, administration, and support for the District. The District Governor (or, more commonly, the DG) is supported by 2 Vice District Governors (also elected), who will normally move up to the DG position according to seniority.
- 9. Each District Cabinet is composed of the DG and 2 assistants, the immediate past District Governor, a secretary, a treasurer, the Zone Chairs, the Region Chairs, Committee Chairs, and advisors (generally Lions who have held higher office in Lions International). This group normally meets four times a year.
- 10. The Cabinet Committee Chairs will have responsibility for things such as District ap-

- proved projects, liaison with specific projects, newsletters, publicity, and so on. Particular assignments reflect the needs and priorities of the individual Districts.

Each District has an annual &convention at which elections $\bar{\sigma}$ are held, changes to the Constitution and Bylaws are apgproved, items and issues of in-and Lions have an opportunity to exchange ideas and accom-§ plishments, and generally ensjoy each others' company.
- 12. Multiple Districts are colclose Clubs to cooperate. Some \$\frac{\pi}{2}\$ lections of Districts that reflect §larger geographic entities than ÖDistricts. These MDs further provide better administrative serve to coordinate activities and the governance of Lions. There is no further layer of organization between Lions Clubs and Lions Clubs International. Multiple District 37, for example, consists of five Districts. 37L runs roughly west from Leduc to Jasper, as far East as Fort Saskatchewan, North to Yellowknife, and Northwest into the Peace Country of British Columbia. It comprises 54 Clubs. The other Districts (I, O, N, S) are South of District L - S, for example is entirely within Montana; N spans both sides of the USA/Canada Border, O is centered on Calgary.
 - 13. Multiple Districts are governed by Councils, so there will be a Council Chair (elected annually), the current District Governors and 1st Vice District Governors, and the usual assortment: Secretary-Treasurer, Committee Chairs, and Advisors.

All but the Administrative Officers MUST be members in good standing of a Chartered Lions Club.)


