To All Lions: Please be aware that there is a vacancy in the position of MD Secretary Treasurer. At present Pauline Cooper is filling this position on an interim basis but we are calling for applications to fill the position on a permanent basis.

These Lions are the 3 member Selection Committee appointed by Council as required by the Bylaws of MD 37.

The duties of the MD 37 Secretary Treasurer are as defined in the MD 37 Bylaws and Policy Manual. These may be viewed/downloaded from the MD 37 Website <http://www.Md37lions.org> under publications.

Under the supervision and direction of Council, the Multiple District Secretary Treasurer shall:

1. Keep an accurate record of the proceedings of all the meetings of the council, and shall within 30 days after each meeting forward copies of the minutes of same to all the members of Council and the Office of Lions Clubs International.
2. Assist the Council in conducting the business of the Multiple District, and shall perform such duties as are specified or implied in the Constitution and Bylaws, or as may be assigned to him/her from time to time by the Council.
3. Have control of the disbursements and receipts subject to supervision by the Council. He/she shall deposit all monies received in the bank, or banks designated by the Council, and shall disburse same by order of said Council.
4. Allow Multiple District accounts, books, and records to be open to inspection by the Council or any auditors named by the Council.
5. Be required to secure a bond in the amount approved by the Council. The cost shall be regarded as a legitimate Multiple District Administrative Fund expense.

Further duties of the MD Secretary Treasurer are outlined in the Contract for Service that shall be entered into between the successful applicant and the MD 37 Council of Governors.

A working knowledge of the operation of the MD 37 Council of Governors or experience in similar positions would be a definite asset. Applicants should possess Knowledge, experience, and skills in business administration, management, public relations, communications, newsletter publishing, computer operation and software (Word processing, internet, spread sheets)

Deadline for postmark or e-mail dated resumes and applications shall be no later than **March 31, 2009**.

Candidate list will be narrowed down to five or six during the month of April.

The committee will interview those candidates at the Multiple District Convention to be held in Havre, Montana on **May 15-16, 2009** choosing two or three to be interviewed by the full Council with a decision being made before the end of the Convention.

MAKING IT HAPPEN (Shaw Telethon)

On Sunday, November 16th, Lions made it happen! Canadian athletes, through the Canadian Athletes Now Fund (CAN Fund), are significantly better off. After Shaw Communications matched all funds raised at the telethon, Canadian athletes have almost \$300,000 more than they had at the beginning of the day.

CAN Fund is a not-for-profit organization devoted to raising funds for Canada's athletes. The fund helps Canada's athletes get ready for the Olympics, both summer and winter, by supporting their training, coaching, nutrition, and living expenses as they prepare for international competition.

Raising \$300,000 takes a great deal of time and planning. When you are televising an eight-hour live event, coast-to-coast, and trying to raise \$300,000, the planning has broader importance. To a broadcaster, ensuring a program is broadcast on-time is essential. The show must go on. There is no option to start the show a couple of minutes late.

Shaw's dedicated staff provided technical, creative, and logistical support and guidance to ensure the event was delivered professionally. The day was executed with military precision. Four on-air hosts, more than 25 television-crew members, more than 70 Olympians (*including the 2008 Olympic Gold Medal winning Men's Eight Rowing Team*) and aspiring Olympians, and over 200 volunteers from Lions Clubs and Shaw ensured our success.

Lions, when we make a commitment, we follow through. Every Lion that committed to volunteering fulfilled their obligations. Of all the organizations involved in the telethon, ours was the only one to achieve 100 per cent attendance. At the end of the day, after the telethon was over, the organizers appreciated and commented on this achievement.

The telethon went on the air at 1:00PM local time. The energy at 12:59 was electrifying as Lions, Shaw employees, and athletes anticipated the start of the broadcast and waited for the first phone call. The energy continued to intensify as we continued to raise more money. A phone bank of 60 volunteer call-takers ensured callers could bid on more than 400 items or make a donation. Auction items included Olympic memorabilia, a diamond ring, works of art, weekend getaways, and a 1976 Cadillac.

Lions, be very proud of the contributions we made to this extremely worthwhile cause. The next time you watch a world cup event, and see Canadian athletes competing, you will see Canadian athletes who have benefited from the work we did on November 16th. In 2010, when you are watching a Canadian athlete take the podium at the Winter Olympics in Vancouver, you will feel shivers run down your spine knowing we made a difference in their life.

Remember, just as creating excellence in an organization is a journey, athletic excellence is not about one run, one race, one competition. It is an expensive, long-term commitment. On November 16th we made it easier for our athletes to achieve athletic excellence. Congratulations!

After several decades of life here's what I've learned to accept:

- Time passes...and I can't change what has happened, even if I wanted to.
- Distance separates...and does not always "make the heart grow fonder".
- Hearts break...but they can heal, with time.

- Children and grandchildren grow up...and have their own lives to live.
- Jobs come and go....what job I *have* or *had* does not define who I am.
- Family and friends die...one of life's events that no one can change.

The Grande Prairie Lions Club would like to thank the Stony Plain Lions Club and the Wembley & District Lions Club for their recent donation of used eyeglasses for our SRI LANKA project.

With cooperation from many sources we have shipped approximately 70,000 pairs. At an estimated value of \$100/pair, a citizen of SRI LANKA would need to work 3 months to afford a pair of glasses. That's a total of 210,000 months of labour, or 17,500 man-years to cover what this project has accomplished. That's a staggering number; one difficult to digest. Maybe our Lions can relate better to this number-at \$100/pair, the project has delivered \$7,000,000 worth of product to the needy citizens of SRI LANKA. That's more than twice the cost of the Lions Learning Centre when it was constructed 6 years ago.

Take a bow Lions! You deserve the applause.

CSFII/SightFirst Program - Frequently Asked Questions

1. How much money was raised in CampaignSightFirst II?

On our final Worldwide Report Day, Lions from around the world reported having raised US\$200,329,297 in cash and pledges. In order to reach this figure and provide "Vision for All", it is important that individual Lions and clubs complete payment on their pledges and commitments.

2. Where will the donations to CSFII be spent?

SightFirst fights blindness where the greatest need exists and will continue to allocate funds wherever greatest impact can be had. Currently, about 90% of avoidable blindness occurs in developing nations. In addition to fighting blindness in the developing world, reaching the CSFII challenge goal of US\$200 million allows for additional funds to be spent in more developed countries, helping Lions to achieve a dream of providing "Vision for All".

3. How much of each donation is spent on administrative costs?

None. One hundred percent of every dollar donated to LCIF funds Lions projects. LCIF funds are invested, allowing the Foundation to pay the administrative costs from the interest earned. In addition to covering administrative costs, excess investment earning increase the overall funds available for grants.

4. How can Lions receive funding for a SightFirst Project?

All SightFirst grant applications are submitted to LCIF. Eligible grants are first examined by independent technical advisors and SightFirst program staff. The SightFirst Advisory Committee reviews grant applications three times annually. The Committee is comprised of Lion leaders, experts from the World Health Organization, and some of the world's foremost technical advisors in the area of blindness prevention. If you have an idea for a SightFirst project, work with LCIF staff as early as possible. They will assist you in submitting the best possible proposal for consideration.

5. How long can new gifts and/or pledges be submitted to CSFII?

New gifts and/or pledges may be submitted to LCIF for CSFII credit until December 31, 2008. After December 31, 2008 donors may designate their gifts to SightFirst but not for CSFII or Melvin Jones Fellowship credit.

6. How long to I have to pay my CSFII pledge?

Payments toward existing CSFII pledges may be made for up to five years after the date the pledge was made. The last CSFII pledges are, therefore, scheduled to be paid in full by 2012.

7. Will there be a Campaign SightFirst III?

Lions Clubs International Foundation will continue to fight preventable and reversible blindness as long as there is a need. At this time there are no plans for Campaign SightFirst III; however, if the need exists in the future, LCIF and Lions will respond.

Club Reports:

Gibbons- Still striving to increase membership. They continue to work casinos and do other fundraising projects to help out the community. Lions Club vest are still available through the Morinville Club. They are hosting the Western Canadian Challenge volleyball tournament on 16-18 Oct. They will also be doing the Nov 11 Remembrance Day service, Breakfast with Santa, and Child Find finger printing. They also continue to sell Lions Mints.

Vimy-Lion Bob reported that the club now has 24 members and are planning for another 6 new members this year. They have donated funds to build a Playschool playground. Renovations to the Vimy Community Hall have been done to include wheel chair access. They will be doing 2 casinos this year for fundraisers. The club is hosting the annual Fall Supper at the community centre on 25 Oct. Westlock- Lion Jonathan reported that they had a quiet summer this year. They have donated \$500.00 to a school scholarship program. They will continue with a 50/50 draw prior to Christmas. They will also be doing their annual Christmas tree sales. Possible on new member being transferred in to the club. They will also be doing an Easter draw. He advised that if any other club needs help working the casinos or bingos to give him a call.

Athabasca- Lion Gloria reported that they are trying to conduct fun

events. They have 5 new prospective members. There is a meeting at the UofA reference the Sight program being conducted. They held the River Raft Festival this past summer. There was a BBQ at the Lions Park with a demonstration of a GPS for blind people. They hosted a pancake breakfast for the Fiddler Contest. They purchased a zamboni for the arena from proceeds of a casino. They will be conducting a training session for dealers. The sandbags have been filled and distributed to gas stations for the annual sales. The club donated \$1500.00 toward a school scholarship program.

Busby and District- The club is hoping to increase their membership this year and to improve on the awareness and exposure of the projects the club is doing. They will sustain the ongoing projects of Scholarships for schools, Busby Playschool, and the Farmers Festival. They will be supporting the renovation project to the Community Hall. They have made a donation to Camp He Ho Ha.

Legal- Lion Fred reported that a drive will be going on to increase memberships this year. We currently have 9 members with another 3 prospects at this time. An advertising campaign for new members will begin soon. The club purchased a new BBQ for community use. The annual pancake breakfast was done in conjunction with the Fete Au Village. The bingos were cancelled this summer due to flooding at the Grandin hall. It is expected to reopen soon, but has created a shortfall for available funds for the community. A casino is scheduled for Feb, 2009 to raise money for the new bus. The club has applied for a grant to help purchase the bus. Financial support has been given to Camp He Ho Ha.

Approved district Projects- Camp He Ho Ha, Can Tabs, Lion Bill Weber Fellowships for the Lions Eye Bank, Lions Foundation of Canada Special Needs Dogs. Lion Francis asked if the cabinet is planning to support the Leader Dogs in Alberta program. Lion Margaret stated that the District will only support the one Special Needs Dog program.

EYE CARE HUMANITARIAN MISSION LED BY LION ANYTHONY HARYCHAN

At the November 20th regular meeting of the Edmonton Host Lions Club, Lion Anthony Harychan and Lion Carole Henson, both members of that club, gave a slide presentation on their Canadian Vision Care (CVC) humanitarian mission to Guyana in March, 2008. The Edmonton Host Lions Club has generously contributed thousands of dollars over the years in aid of these missions. Lion Anthony and Lion Carole explained just how the Club's donations have helped change the lives of thousands of people in need of eye care. CVC uses the money to pay for lenses, equipment, and drugs that accompany volunteer eye care teams to developing countries such as Jamaica, Costa Rica, and Guyana.

During the 5-day clinic held in Georgetown, Guyana, Lion Anthony's seven-member team, hosted by the local Lions Club of Central Demerara, examined 1,350 people (901 children and 449 adults). 286 pairs of reading glasses were dispensed, 167 prescriptions were issued, and 14 surgical (cataract) referrals were made. The prescriptions are brought back to Canada where the glasses are assembled and then sent back to the local Lions Club where the members distribute them to the patients. The patients who are referred for surgery have their cataracts removed and can once again see. The clinic was held in the Lions Club of Central Demerara's Lions Den and Civic Centre building, where the Club holds its regular meetings and functions.
