Jack Little is the first recipient of the District's Citizen of Distinction Award, and he was presented with a Melvin Jones Fellowship in his name at the District Convention on November 3rd. He was one of three nominees, in what the selection committee considered to be an outstanding field.

Jack Little is probably best known as the Executive Director of Edmonton's Heritage Days Festival, an outdoor event held every August at Hawrelak Park in Edmonton, featuring song and dance, food, cultural activities, and souvenirs from more than 60 national pavilions from around the world. The 2012 edition entertained more than 350,000 visitors in its long weekend run.

Jack has always been a volunteer, and following his 29 years at Sunwapta Broadcasting (CFRN), starting in sales, and ending as general manager, he has been a board member of the Edmonton Gleaners (Food Bank) for 14 years, and its Chair for six of those years. While at CFRN Jack was a strong supporter of the ACT Telethons.

Presidency of the Western Association of Broadcasters, Chairmanship of the Central and Northern Alberta Better Business Bureau, volunteering with the Greater Edmonton Foundation Housing for Seniors and CTV's Good Neighbour Fund, are all part of Jack's interests.

Leduc Lions on Ice

Leduc Lions have committed \$300,000 to the funding for a new ice rink. They have paid \$100,000 already, and are committed to paying another \$50,000 a year over the next four years. The money for this donation is from the campground income.

The rink is designed to be used in summer as well and is located immediately behind both a public and Catholic K-6 school. The students will be able to use it easily. The City of Leduc has agreed to develop a "Lions Park" in the new West Haven subdivision.

The "Lions Park" will include a playground and the Lions can add other amenities as they wish.

Notice to all Lions in District 37L

The following will be on the agenda for the February 2nd, 2013 District 37L Cabinet meeting. If any Lions club or Lions member has comments please submit them to PCC Donna Coulter at Ldcgp@telusplanet.net by January 25th, 2013.

District 37L Policy Manual, Chapter 1. Section C., Changes currently states: *Lions Clubs in good standing, District Committees, members of the Cabinet, or individual delegates from the floor, at regularly scheduled or Special Cabinet meetings may recommend Policy Manual changes to the Cabinet giving details and explanations of the recommendations.*

District 37L Policy Manual, Section D, of Chapter 1, currently reads: *The District 37L Policy Manual shall be perpetual and may be amended by Cabinet within the following guidelines:*

1. Change Procedure

Any proposed Policy Manual changes shall be presented to the Constitution and By-Laws Committee immediately following the Cabinet meeting at which said changes were proposed.

a. The Constitution and By-Laws Committee shall submit the requested changes to Cabinet for discussion and action (by majority vote) at their next regularly scheduled meeting.

b. Proposed changes to the Policy Manual scheduled to come before the Cabinet at their next regularly scheduled meeting shall be so noted immediately in the next issue of the District 37L Bulletin.

Those guidelines *could* result in it taking considerable time for a Cabinet to approve changes. So, it has been recommended to Cabinet that the current Section D. Change Procedure 1, subsections a. b, and c, be deleted in their entirety and the following be put into District 37L Policy in Chapter 1.

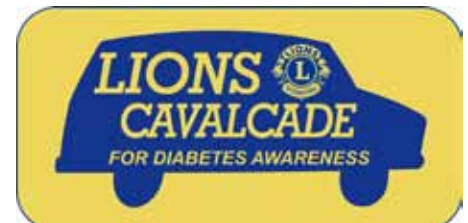
Section D. Perpetuity: The District 37L Policy Manual shall be perpetual and may be amended by the District Cabinet.

1. Procedure for Proposing Changes to District 37L Policies:
 - a. Thirty (30) days prior to any District 37L Cabinet regular meeting all proposals for changes to District 37L Policies shall be provided in writing by post, fax, or e-mail to the District 37L Constitution, Bylaws and Policies Committee for its review.
 - b. All proposals so submitted and reviewed shall be provided to the District Cabinet Secretary for placing on the agenda of the next regularly scheduled 37L Cabinet

meeting. The club(s) or Lions member(s) who submitted the proposal shall be advised by the District 37L Cabinet Secretary of the date, time and place of the Cabinet meeting at which their proposal(s) will be discussed. If present at that meeting, a representative of the proposal will be given an opportunity to speak to the proposal.

- c. A decision by a simple majority vote of the District 37 L Cabinet may be made at the District 37L Cabinet meeting at which any proposal or proposals were presented.

Notes on Yellowknife's Spookarama Project

(From NWT Hansard)

MEMBER'S STATEMENT ON

YELLOWKNIFE SPOOK-A-RAMA HALLOWEEN YOUTH DANCE

MS. BISARO: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Last night Yellowknife had another successful Halloween Spook-a-Rama. Today I want to acknowledge the sponsorship of this event, Yellowknife's longest standing Halloween tradition.

Spook-a-Rama has been put on by the Yellowknife Lion's Club for the last 45 years. As

long-time Lion's Club Member and organizer Don Finnamore told me, we are now

getting third-generation spooks. Spook-a-Rama was started in response to Halloween vandalism in downtown Yellowknife. Members of the Yellowknife Lion's Club came up with the idea for a teen dance on Halloween. It would give the youth something to do in a safe environment and would cut down on vandalism Halloween night.



The event was and still is a partnership between Yellowknife businesses and the Lion's Club. Originally organized by an RCMP officer who was also a Lion's Club member, the effort to keep the kids off the streets on Halloween night is still a joint effort between the RCMP, the Lion's Club, and DND, the Department of National Defence, funded by Yellowknife businesses.

For as long as anyone can remember, Spook-a-Rama has been held at the DND 440 Squadron RCMP hangar at the airport. It's for youth 13 to 18 years of age and no matter the

day, it is always held on Halloween night. The event is free and free bus service to and from is provided throughout the city. Everyone who



attends is searched at the door to keep the event safe. Even if the kids go outside, they are searched when they come back in. Any adults that come in to speak with their son or daughter are escorted while they're in the building; again for safety. Food is always served, lots of food, I'm told, and music throughout the evening and there are prizes. The main prize is a trip for two to Edmonton provided by First Air or Canadian North. The door prizes are one of the drawing cards to get the kids to the dance. I'm told 'good' prizes means the youth will attend.

It costs about \$7,000 to put on Spook-a-Rama. That's the cost for soft drinks, pizza, busses, advertising, DJ services and door prizes. In the mid-2000s it was touch and go whether or not enough money would be raised to hold the event, but like most northern communities, when it really counts, the community

comes together and contributes what is needed, and in this case Spook-a-Rama happened one more time. Year after year Spook-a-Rama has achieved its purpose to reduce vandalism on Halloween night.

Mr. Speaker, I seek unanimous consent to conclude my statement.

---Unanimous consent granted

MS. BISARO: In 2000 the Lion's Club president said, "According to the RCMP, while we've been having this dance, acts of vandalism by youth 13 to 18 years old has been zero percent." The same holds true today. To quote Mr. Finnamore one more time, "Since the Lion's Club has been doing the event, vandalism at Halloween is almost nonexistent."

I want to say thank you to the YK Lion's Club for their service to our city.

Congratulations on another successful Spook-a-Rama. May you have many more.

Call For Nominations from the Canadian Lions of MD 37

At our MD 37 District Convention to be held in Helena, Montana on May 17 – 18, 2013, there will be an election for the following office:

• Alberta Provincial Director for Lions Foundation of Canada (Dog Guides) for 2014 – 2017.

Nominations for this position are to be received by the MD 37 Office by March 1, 2013. They can be sent by email to cst.tim@gapproductions.com or mailed to MD 37 Office, 147 Rocky Ridge Bay NW, Calgary, AB, T3G 4E7

The following are the qualification for the position for your information:

ARTICLE 5 QUALIFICATIONS FOR PROVINCIAL DIRECTORS

Section I: To qualify as a Candidate for Provincial Director on the Lions Foundation of Canada Board, he or she must;

- (a) Be a Lion in good standing; and
 - (b) Any one of the following:
 - (i) Served as a District Representative for the Lions Foundation of Canada as appointed by the Provincial Director
 - (ii) Served as a District Representative for the Lions Foundation of Canada as appointed by the District Governor
 - (iii) Served as the Multiple District Representative for the Lions Foundation of Canada as appointed by the Council Chairman
 - (iv) Has served as District Governor, and has participated in the Lions Foundation of Canada's orientation program;
 - (v) Has served as a Representative, appointed by the Lions Foundation of Canada Board
- promoting and supporting one of the Lions Foundation of Canada projects.
- (c) It shall be the duty of the sitting Director to advise the selecting body of the qualifications required to be nominated as a Provincial Director.

Section 2:

(a) All nominations as a candidate for the position of Provincial Director shall come as the result of whatever process has been adopted by each individual province for selection of its Provincial Director, and all such nominations, together with a resume of the candidate's Qualifications, including but not limited to his/her Business Experience, Community Activity, Lionistic Record and Current Involvement, must be received at the Foundation's Head Office in Oakville, on or before December 31st, of the year immediately preceding the year the Director would be elected to office.

(b) It shall be the duty of the current Director to notify the Corporation in writing of the name and address of the candidate for Director for his or her Province &/or Territory.

Section 3: All nominations received by Lions Foundation of Canada for the position of Provincial Director are subject to final approval, without prejudice by the Board of Directors of the Lions

Foundation of Canada provided the nominee meets the qualifications set out in Section #1. Such approval shall be at the mid-winter meeting held each year. (See Policy Manual: Appendix 1, for Provincial Selection Procedures).
